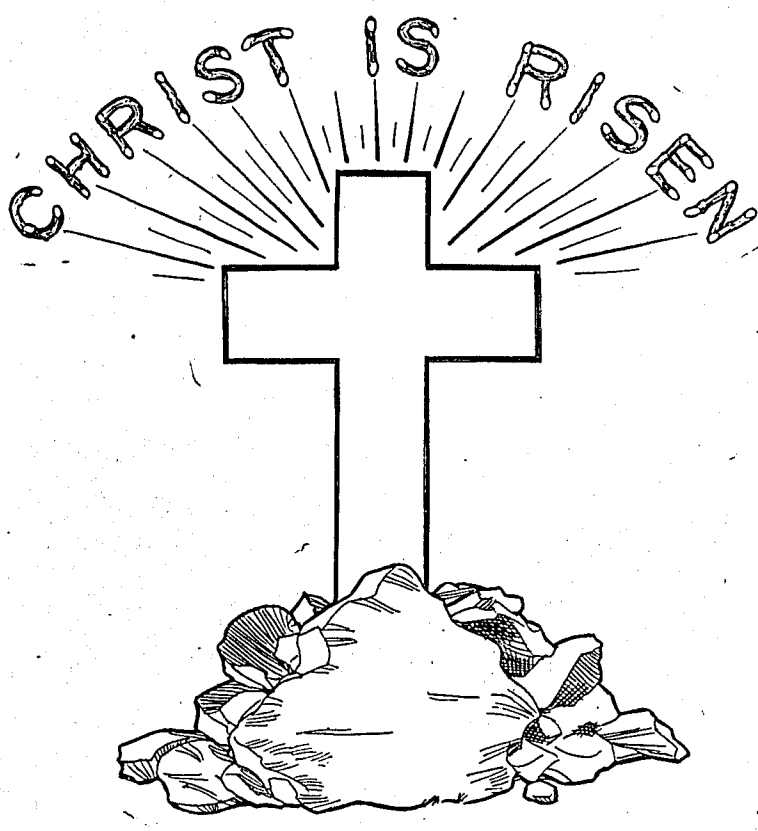
Welfare Dept.

Reports 72 Cases

Seventy-two cases have been reported on relief here by the Welfare Department, Town Hall, with 64 cases on relief as of March 1, 1938, 12 of which were dropped and 20 new cases opened.

Of the 297 individuals, 163 are on the town, 87 on other towns and 47 on the state.

Eleven have been reported in hospitals and 6 are in state institutions.

Regulations Issued For Bicycle Riders

Rules Drawn Upon Statement By Chief Farrell Concerning Arrests.

District Exempt Forest Fire Law, Named

In accordance with section 537d of the general statutes, I hereby set aside the following described district in the Town of East Haven as exempt from the operation of the Forest Fire Permit Law, Section 537d. This exemption holds until the fifteenth day of March, 1939.

This district is described as follows and runs in a counter-clockwise direction from the point of beginning, viz:

Beginning at the corner of Main and High Streets, so called, in the Town of East Haven, and running north on the westerly side of High Street to Kimberly Avenue; on the south and east sides of Kimberly Avenue to Main Street; the north side of Main Street to Gerrish Avenue; the east side of Gerrish Avenue to Tyler Avenue; the north side of Tyler Avenue to French Avenue; the east side of French Avenue to Dodge Avenue; the north side of Dodge Avenue to Hemingway Avenue; the west side of Hemingway Avenue to Main Street; the south side of Main Street to the point of beginning.

The American Legion Safety Promotion Committee has drawn up regulations for riders of bicycles, to be issued through Supt. William E. Gillis of the East Haven Public Schools, upon the issuance of a statement this week by Chief of Police Hugh Farrell that arrests will be made in matters of traffic violations by bicyclists.

Regulations

Regulations for bicyclists are listed as follows:

1. Learn to ride in a park or other safe places. Stay off the streets until you can ride well.
2. Have your bicycle equipped with proper brakes, lights and bell or horn. Keep it adjusted to fit you, and in good condition. Check your brakes frequently.
3. When riding, keep to the right, close to the curb. If local ordinance require riding on the sidewalks, be sure you are considerate of pedestrians.
4. Obey all traffic rules and regulations. Use hand signals when you are going to stop or turn.
5. Ride without wobbling and avoid sharp turns. Weaving through traffic is dangerous. Avoid fast riding over slippery or rough roads.
6. Never carry a passenger. It is dangerous.
7. Never hold on to a moving vehicle.
8. When riding at night carry a light in front, and either a light or reflector in the rear. Light-colored clothing also help motorists to see you.
9. Do not try to carry an object in your hand, or to ride in the street no-handed. If parcels must be carried, they should be strapped to the bicycle or placed in a carrier.
10. Choose your route carefully. Avoid crowded streets and highways.

East Haven's First Librarian

The next problem before the Board of Directors was the providing of funds necessary for increasing the number of books. At the start donations of books came from the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the old collection of library books belonging to the public school system, and from various townspeople. The Town of East Haven at the October Town Meeting, appropriated twenty-five dollars as a yearly grant to sustain the library.

Mrs. F. B. Street, wife of one of the members of the Board of Directors, very kindly gave a lawn fete to raise funds, and was able thereby to net nearly two hundred dollars for the young library.

Mr. George H. Townsend, a civic-minded gentleman then living just outside of East Haven, but who held the welfare of this infant library organization close to his heart, very generously offered to match the

library backers with cash equal to such an amount as they were able to raise. As a result Mr. Townsend donated the amount of thirty-six dollars and seventeen cents on January 22nd, 1910.

Up until this time Miss Street, the Librarian, had given freely of her time necessary for the operation of the library and to show their appreciation of this fact, the Board of Directors at their Board meeting, of January 22nd, voted to allow Miss Street the money she had taken in on fines charged for books overdue. While from that point onward the Directors very gladly did what they could to reimburse Miss Street for the many thousands of hours she has spent in the interest of the library, it has always been pitifully small. It is true that Miss Street handled the librarian's duties as a work of love.

Much credit belongs to Miss

Street in the new library holding the interest of the townspeople. It is largely owing to Miss Street's spirit of helpfulness to all who came to the library, the interest of Mrs. Harriet Metcalf's was secured and the Board of Directors were indeed encouraged to learn on February 4th, 1911, following the passing of Mrs. Metcalf that she had left a legacy of over one thousand dollars. This kindly act was greatly appreciated and was of course an aid to the new library. Little did they realize at the time that Miss Street's spirit of thoughtfulness was indirectly responsible for the later bequest from Mr. Isaac Hagaman. It must be remembered that Mrs. Metcalf kept house for Mr. Hagaman and undoubtedly her strong interest in the growing library aroused a desire within Mr. Hagaman to really establish the library permanently in the years to follow.

Oysters from southern waters have less copper but more iron than those from the North Atlantic states, says the New Jersey state department of agriculture.

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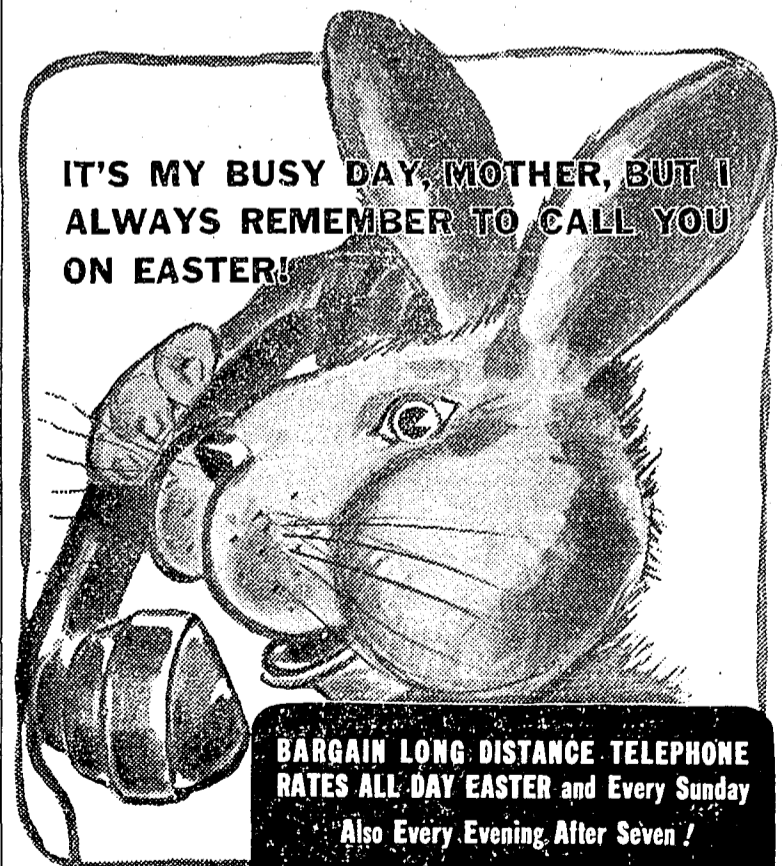
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Riding of bicycles anywhere within the station is prohibited. This includes all public areas, ticket halls, platforms and connecting passageways. It is forbidden to lock bicycles within the station area, including platforms, ticket halls and all passageways, other than in those areas specifically allocated for this purpose. Bicycles locked in any unauthorized areas will be removed and the owner will be responsible for any costs entailed by Israel Rail. Boarding the train with a bicycle.
