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A book cover is any protective covering used to bind together the pages of a book. Beyond the familiar distinction between hardcovers and paperbacks, there are further alternatives and additions, such as dust jackets, ring-binding, and older forms such as the nineteenth-century "paper-boards" and the traditional types of hand-binding. The term "Bookcover" is often used for a book cover image in library management software. This article is concerned with modern mechanically produced covers. A book cover has three mandatory parts: the front cover and the back cover, connected by the spine. A paperback book's pages are glued together with a paper cover and then cut to size. A hardback book's pages are sewn or glued into a "case" made of cardboard which is then covered with cloth or paper. The paper cover wraps around the book and includes flaps on either side. Go to your local bookstore and handle books to get a feeling for the different paper thicknesses and materials. Make notes about what you like and don't like—that information could prove useful way later in the design process if you hit a wall.
