**Teaching record:**

**Course Director (Conference Director):**

Morning Report: This conference occurs twice each week and consists of presentations by senior residents of recently admitted patients. Led by the Pediatric Chief Residents, the conference is highly participatory and includes medical students, residents, and faculty who engage in creating a differential diagnosis, evaluation scheme, and management approach. I work with the Chief Residents in keeping the quality of the conference high. Four years ago, I led an effort to make the conference qualify for CME credits. Since that time, approximately two thousand CME credit hours have been earned by faculty attendees.

Chair Rounds: This conference occurs once each week and consists of the presentation by senior residents of a single case which represents an

important pediatric disorder. The presentation is followed by audience participation and then by an organized and rehearsed discussion of evidence-based information about diagnosis and management. The audience is the same as for Morning Report and is also run by the Chief Residents. My role is the same as for Morning Report. This conference also now qualifies for CME credits and faculty have earned at least a thousand hours of CME credit since the conference became qualified.

## **Clinical Teaching, Student Preceptorships, and Attending on Clinical Service:**

Each year I spend three months (six two-week rotations) on the General Pediatrics Inpatient Team (Green Team). During those rotations I supervise the activities of a senior pediatric or medicine-pediatrics resident, two pediatric or medicine-pediatrics interns, four medical students, a nurse coordinator, a pharmacist, a nutritionist, and a pediatric care coordinator. In a conference room, I discuss the individual care of each of our patients and then accompany the team into the room of each of our patients where the patient is examined by me and the patient's care is discussed with the parent(s). During each two-week rotation, I have individual discussions with each medical student and resident about their progress and provide suggestions for improvement. I also provide evaluations of each learner to our Education Office. Following each rotation, I write a letter to each resident outlining my overall evaluation of their performance. A significant number of the medical students and residents later seek my mentorship about career issues.
