Jane Austen's six short novels, with a volume of letters and a handful of juvenilia and fragments, have given rise to a stream of critical commentary which, starting quietly enough in her own lifetime and hardly increasing in the course of the nineteenth century, has in our own generation swollen to a mighty torrent. Jane Austen critic Myra Stokes informs her readers that "we tend to have such a caricatured notion of the "drawing-room-world" of this period that it is perhaps worth emphasizing that formality was distinctly out of fashion." (Stokes 99) This was certainly true for Jane Austen. Towards the end of the novel, she lets the implied author seem to be fed up with describing the same formalities over and over again.
