Chapter 2 Linking Methods With Theory. What's Theory Got to Do With It? Although "what's theory got to do with it" doesn't quite roll off the tongue in the way that Tina Turner's 1980s hit "What's Love Got to Do With It" does, it is nevertheless just as important a question. Perhaps not everyone will be compelled by this reference to a hit of the 1980s. In this chapter, we'll explore the connections between paradigms, social theories, and social scientific research methods. Grounded Theory Methods and Qualitative Family Research. There is an irony—perhaps a paradox—here: that a methodology that is based on "interpretation" should itself prove so hard to interpret. (Dey, 1999, p. 23). Among the different qualitative approaches that may be relied upon in family theorizing, grounded theory methods (GTM), developed by Barney Glaser and Anselm Strauss, are the most popular. Despite their centrality to family studies and to other fields, however, GTM can be opaque and confusing.
